CALL COMMITTEE UPDATE

It's been a busy and reflective Lenten season for the Call Committee: we have been meeting weekly for the past month or more. By the time you read this, we will have completed the initial round of interviews with three of the candidates the Bishop sent to us in early March. The first interview was on March 20th, and the last on March 30th. One candidate from the mid-west withdrew his name from the process after deciding that a move to Bellingham at this point wouldn't work for him and his family.

We're very excited about the candidates that are coming to interview. We've enjoyed getting to know them through their mobility papers, talks with references, phone calls and e-mails, and it will be even better to meet them face to face. Their skills and strengths seem to be a great match for our congregation.

We may decide that we would like to have a second interview with our top choice(s); if so, those interviews would happen after Easter. In the unlikely event that none of the candidates seems like the one we've been waiting for, we would begin the interview process again with a new slate of names from the Bishop.

The congregation will have a chance to meet the final candidate in an informal "getting-to-know-you" event sometime in late April. Shortly thereafter, the congregation will come together in a special meeting for the purpose of voting to extend the call to that pastor, and to approve the compensation package.

Many people from the congregation have stepped up and offered to help with providing housing, meals, welcome baskets, and even clean-up. That has been so heartening and such a blessing. Thank you again for your continued prayers and support: we couldn't do our work without that strong foundation.

Matt Springer commented to me recently that it is going to be "Hot and Humid" when we are there. Oh how true that statement is! As we prepare for this trip, we encourage you to keep us in your prayers. We continue to work on fundraising with three more main efforts. We will be setting up, serving, and cleaning up during Easter brunch; we are holding the "Jesus, Justice, & Jazz Dinner & Auction" on May 2nd; and we will be doing a letter writing campaign requesting prayer support and financial investment.

Consider for a moment that 35,000 youth and adults will be making a pilgrimage to New Orleans in response to God's call to serve and gather as Lutherans in worship and fellowship. The "Jesus, Justice, and Jazz" title reflects the nature of this event well. We honor, support, and encourage our youth to embrace the greater church body through these experiences in shared community and service. Please encourage and thank these folks as they prepare for their journey.

In The Interim

I want to thank Pastor Jim, council, call committee, staff, and the congregation members at large for all the work and effort to make this interim time go as smoothly as possible. As a staff member working in this interim time, I face daily challenges that are brought to the surface due to change. Change is difficult, and for the most part we have fared well. During the past month we were faced with challenges about how to make decisions about use of space. In the process of making decisions it became apparent that communication was challenging. Each committee involved had valid concerns and needs that could have been over-looked if we hadn't openly shared our frustrations. In the end we all came together collaboratively to seek out a solution. Christ the Servant has a strong backbone of lay leadership and it has been this leadership that has helped things to stabilize when things have felt shaky. I am grateful for the whole congregation practicing a non anxious presence as we trust in God's guidance in each step forward.

Clarity of vision and purpose gives us stability and direction. At the core of who we are as a church is worship. I have truly enjoyed and been richly blessed by our worship leadership team that lovingly works at creating a variety of meaningful experiences. I hold up this group as an example of stability in our community during this interim. Any given church has corner stones that create stability and balance. As we move into a time of new leadership each corner stone will discover renewal, reorientation, and adventure with a new pastor. Hearing and seeing new adventures yet unknown through the eyes of this new leader should be our greatest hope. I pray that God will build up trust in us to see this time of change as an adventure that will challenge and excite us.

THE BLESSINGS OF BIONICS!

Saturday, April 18th here at CTS

If you are over 40, you probably remember the popular TV series, *The Six Million Dollar Man* (circa 1974), starring Lee Majors, a pop culture icon of the times. This was followed by a spin-off starring Lindsay Wagner as *The Bionic Woman*. Lee and Lindsay were *cyborgs*, humans whose bodies have been taken over, in whole or in part, by electromechanical devices. Far out science fiction in those days, but no more.

Two members of our congregation could now be called cyborgs as a result of phenomenal advancements in bioengineering and electrophysiology. Bert Lederer and Charlene MacKenzie recently received cochlear implants, a surgically placed electrode array in the inner ear with an external processor that looks like a large hearing aid. Bert and Charlene have



progressed from being essentially deaf to hearing in the normal range. Not science fiction by any means!

How would you like to know more about the bionic restoration of ability to understand speech and enjoy music? Perhaps you have a friend or family member that might be interested, too. So mark your calendar for April 18th when the Hearing Loss Association of Whatcom County meets in the Community Room from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m. Bert will give a presentation about cochlear implants and share his personal experience. The program, *Living with a Cochlear Implant – Six Months of Brain Training*, will also include a live demonstration of Sprint's web based captioned telephoning. A no-host luncheon at The Five Columns restaurant will follow the meeting.

A while back there were some Sunday School materials developed called The Purple Puzzle Tree. There was a record in the packet with a recurring song:

A long, long time ago, when God was very young,
He has no one to walk with, he had no one to talk with,
He had no one to play with.
Now that wasn't very good, now was it?

What we learned was that God created people for connection, with God and with each other. Little people are free to connect with others repeatedly. This sets neural patterns in their brains for the rest of their lives that will allow them to form strong bonds with others later.

You have these pathways embedded in you. Maybe they are open and flowing. Maybe they are a bit calcified or at least out of use.

Who are your playmates today? Who can you call and say, "Do ya wanna play with me?" Why don't you count them up, yeh, right now. If there are lots, sit back, smile and feel warm. Give thanks to God. If there are few, you might be more isolated than you want to be.

God Does not want you to be alone. God wants you to have playmates. Take a chance. Call someone and ask if they wanna come out and play. They just might say yes.

God has created us as community, family, & co-workers, and Jesus called us friends. So let's get to know each other.

John Eagon has been with Christ the Servant about four years. Just seven years ago he became married to his wife, Betty, at Central Lutheran. John asks, "How could I ever be so fortunate to marry THE best person in the world? Truly Betty is the neatest person!"

John and Betty worship most every Sunday with his daughters Claudia (Rick) Ackerman, and Cindy with her husband Jim and their son, Heath Oberlander. John finds much joy in his 5 grandchildren and 11 great grandchildren who are scattered from Bellingham to Tokyo.

Fremont, Ohio, near Toledo holds many happy childhood memories for John. He had a pony and a horse and would ride around on a sleigh with his father, bells and all! Many a sunny day would find him fishing with his mother. His father died young, and John and his mother moved to Walla Walla, Washington where at 19 he met and married his late wife, a Lutheran Pastor's kid. That was when the Methodist John became a Lutheran. They were married for 56 years.

John doesn't have any hobbies per se. "My primary interests are my family and work." Like his father, who owned and operated a funeral home in Fremont, John has spent a lifetime career serving in funeral homes. He enjoys helping others during a low spot in their lives. Some remark that he appears always to be a "proper, dignified funeral director." Then they see him at the Elks Club dancing!

God is a trustworthy giver of good things. A life of faith has days of doubt, John says, but, "I have every hope that heaven will be my home and I know my life on earth is better for

knowing God."

Making it extra special was the presence of my son and his then-girlfriend, who flew in from Se-

attle to wave at me in the audience and to hear the mass.”

Another recent blessing was participating in her son’s wedding to her wonderful, beautiful daughter-in-law Alpa. “Anyone who has ever attended a wedding, in which the vows are in Sanskrit, can appreciate my sentiments that human values, and the importance of binding two families together through marriage, have far more similarities across cultures than differences. Please don’t tell them, but I’m now praying for a pregnancy with twins!”

Kathy loves to write and does so every night—after her real estate work is completed.

This “cradle Lutheran,” was baptized at Ballard First Lutheran Church in Seattle when 6 months old. Kathy’s father was finally back from Alaska, where he was serving as a Navy pilot.
