Saturday, March 21, 9:30 - 11:30 at CTS will be special. The Whatcom Chapter of the Hearing Loss Association of America which meets regularly here each month on the third Saturday, will get an eyeful and an earful on a heartwarming project targeting Guatemalan children with hearing loss. ### Child's Play

Remember when it came so naturally? You just played. You didn't think about it.



Someone once said, "Play is a child's work." This is the way children create and master their world. They manipulate objects, try out new scenarios, experience power, practice social relationships and much more. Sometimes this doesn't happen. We know that children who are unable to play are often unable to form intimate relationships later in life.

Our large brains are a useful development, but they do have their drawbacks. For one thing, they think too much! Brains analyze, premeditate and reason things out, they plan and sometimes they worry. These aren't bad things unless they are out of balance with other essential ways of being like creative imagination, spontaneity and yes, even play.

All work and no play makes Jack, not only a dull boy, it also endangers his health. Shut down our emotions and our ability to let ourselves just play and we run the risk of ruining our health and shortening our lives.

God created us with inborn tools to allow us to grow up into happy, healthy adults. Some times for reasons, often beyond our control or even outside of our awareness, we lose track of these tools.

So look around this month and see where you might have misplaced your "play" tool. Find it, pick it up, try it out. If it is rusty, lubricate it with smiles, repeated use and loosen it up. Laugh out loud at something. You will know you are being successful when someone says, "What is wrong with you, you aren't acting like yourself!"

Anyone who has lost a loved one in the last years knows how valuable it is to have a document in place like the **Five Wishes**. In completing this document, there are many issues to explore and our sessions will help you to complete this legal document in a thoughtful and caring way.

Beginning Sunday, from 9:45 to 10:45 am, March 1 and continuing on March 8, 22, and 29, the Parish Nurses and Health Ministry will present "Five Wishes". This program is a comprehensive and practical series that explores end-of-life issues. It includes:


- deciding who the person will be to make health care decisions for you when you no longer can
- specifying the kind of medical treatment you want or don't want
- listing comfort measures that you would like to have
- describing ways that you want people to treat you telling your loved ones, in writing, other things they should know, like the type of funeral or memorial service, specific hymn and readings, etc.

You will discover by attending this program, that even if you have a Living Will or an Advance Directive for Health Care already in place, this document will enhance and clarify issues for those caring for you.
